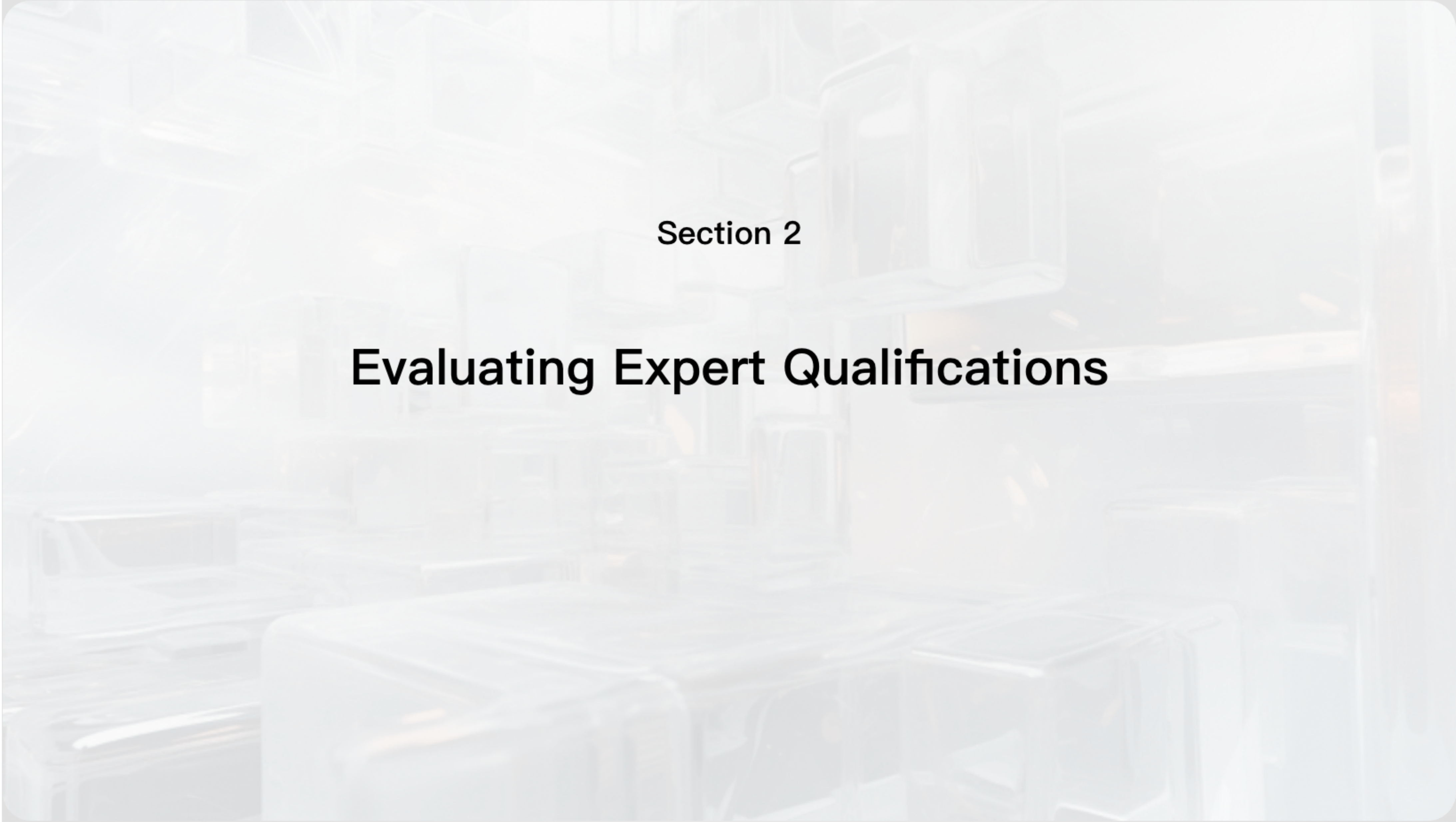

Background Checks

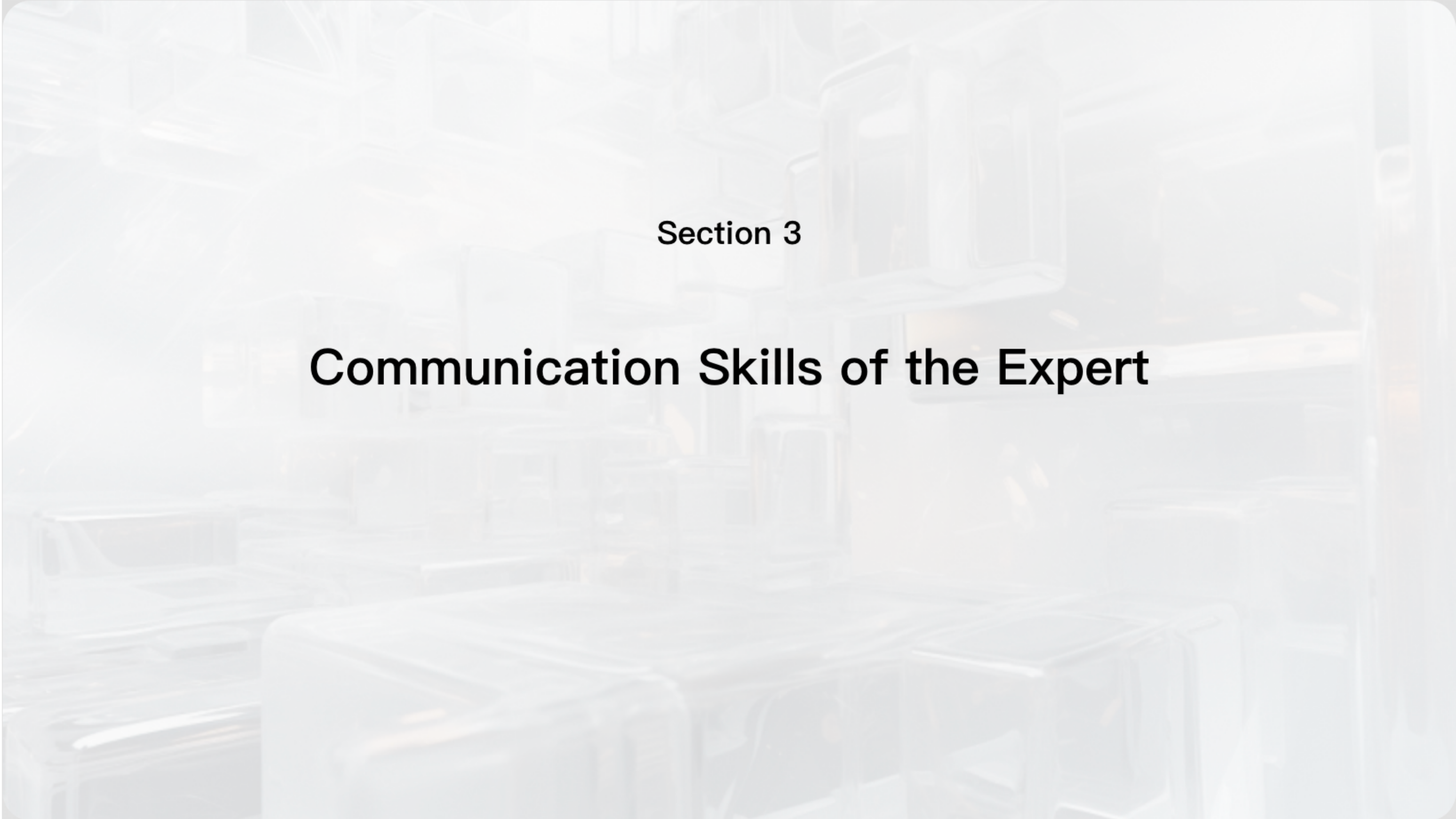
